- Advised that the Sports Advisory Council meeting was held recently.
- Met with Te Korowai Roopu Tautoko Inc and had lots of interesting discussions. She felt that there were gaps Council could help to fill.

Cr John Williamson

- Met with Kelly from Active Arts Taupō along with Council's Events and Venues Manager and Library and Museum Manager. Active Arts was seeking reassurance for the lease of their building.

Cr Kirsty Trueman

- Attended the induction with Raukawa and learned how the organisation works and how to better engage with them.
- The new toilet block at the lakefront in Mangakino had been installed and looked great.

Cr Yvonne Westerman

- Attended a Waiora Community Trust meeting the previous week, followed by another meeting to ensure the process was established on how to manage and run Waiora House. Some work was still required, and the new manager and coordinator job had been advertised the previous week.
- Attended the recent Sports Advisory Council meeting.
- Met with the Taupō Rowing and Waka Ama clubs regarding their roofing issues and protecting their boats.
- Met with the Waipahihi Botanical Society who were concerned about the flight path and the native trees that needed pruning.
- Invited all interested to attend the Acacia Bay residents Annual General Meeting on 20 August 2023.

Cr Kylie Leonard

- Was watching the global dairy trade with interest. Advised that calving was starting and lambing would begin soon.

Cr Sandra Greenslade

- Attended the Tūrangi Co-Governance Committee workshop on 5 July.
- Met with Hon Louise Upston in Tūrangi and visited the services around the town centre. It was the

day after the road had closed so was good timing for the Leader of the National Party Mr Christopher Luxon to experience what locals went through when the road was closed between Tūrangi and Taupō and they had to drive a lot further around the other side of the lake.

- Was pleased that there had been many visitors to Tūrangi in the second week of the school holidays.
- A week of events celebrating Matariki in Tūrangi had finished with the successful Shimmer and Shine event on 14 July.
- Chaired the Tongariro Representative Group meeting on 19 July at the Omori Community Hall.

Mayor David Trewavas

5.3 TAUPŌ DISTRICT COUNCIL PERFORMANCE REPORT - JUNE 2023

The Chief Executive reflected that this performance report was an opportunity to look back. She highlighted the awards staff and Council had received, as well as the recognition for long service to Council particularly of those working in the cemeteries. She advised that there was no finance report this month due to it being the end of the financial year.

The Project Management Office Manager advised that there were no changes to significant projects overall other than an increase in delivery. She noted that Project Quantum had been added and would remain on the monthly report going forward.

The General Manager People and Community Partnerships clarified that while this project had commenced five years before, some technology was already being used. The project team had recently taken time to check that it remained fit for purpose and that the scope was correct. The existing technology and improvements needed to be balanced so that progress continued to be made. Other councils were using the new systems so Council was also taking their learnings into consideration. She confirmed that a workshop for Elected Members would be scheduled to give them an overview of the project and its progress.

The Minister of Finance Grant Robertson had approved funding to complete the Tūrangi revitalisation project largely thanks to the mahi of the Infrastructure Project Manager – Operations.

The Infrastructure Project Manager – Operations advised that the Tūrangi street revitalisation project was progressing well despite challenges with concrete supply. Council had met with alternative suppliers who had assisted with this. An independent arborist had come out to see the sites. The community was on board, was excited about work on its streets, the feedback was mostly positive, and nothing had been mentioned on Facebook. The additional funding received enabled Council to work through the costings and produce a plan to see what streets could be included. Should not all streets be able to be included, remaining streets could be added into the Long-term Plan.

The Infrastructure Project Manager – Operations confirmed that thanks to the Southern Lake Taupō Engagement Partner speaking to residents of Te Whakarau Street, Tūrangi, these residents were now onboard with the development in their street. He clarified that the criteria for trees marked for removal were causing damage to the footpath, road or infrastructure. He would discuss remaining trees which had not been marked but did not appear to be in great condition with the independent arborist.

The Kinloch Drinking Water Standards NZ upgrade project was within budget and the contractor would finalise the last of the work that week.

The footpath in Mangakino leading to the Mangakino Club on Wairenga Road would be completed that week. Following feedback from the community and a survey on accessibility, costings were being sought from contractors to make the town more accessible to mobility scooters and other footpath transport.

The Chief Executive advised that the performance report would be updated to acknowledge the vision and community outcomes once they were finalised. The strategic priorities would subsequently be updated as well.

Introduction

At the time of writing (August 2023) Taupō District Council is currently preparing its 2024-34 Long-Term Plan. As part of this plan's development council is considering what the community has told us is important to them, and using this to help inform our plans for the future.

This document summarises for council's key activities what we have heard from the community recently and those projects we are considering including in our plans going forwards. We are keen to hear from the community as to whether there are other key issues not listed here that we need to consider and plan to address.

Transport

What you've told us

- We've got too many potholes and road surfaces in need of repair. This has been especially bad with wet winters creating more potholes, wet summers hampering repairs, several aging roads, and our roads becoming busier making road works difficult and frustrating for the community.
- Travel is expensive, with fuel costs soaring. The community has concerns about low income and rural communities becoming isolated. Better bus services might help. Many of our rural roads have become very busy. They are narrow and were not designed for so much traffic, and so many big trucks.
- Our state highways – especially between Taupō and Tūrangi, need major investment and upgrades. They are constantly closed with repairs, and crashes, and trucks unable to make the narrow corners.
- Control gates bridge and the entrance into Taupō town from the north is congested at peak times, school times, and busy holidays and weekends.

Where we are heading/ What we're proposing

- We need to improve our road maintenance arrangements. These are currently contracted out and are due for renewal.
- We are planning to resurface several aging roads.
- We will continue to provide a strong focus on road safety initiatives and community programmes.
- We will continue to improve our walking and cycling networks, including:
 - providing safer road crossing points – including on Spa Rd by Countdown.
 - a bridge across to Riverside Park.
