5.3 NOMINATIONS FOR THE TŪRANGI TONGARIRO COMMUNITY GRANT DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE

TE PŪTAKE | PURPOSE

To nominate and appoint two Ngāti Tūrangitukua representatives from the Tūrangi Co-governance Committee to sit on the Tūrangi Tongariro Community Grant Distribution Committee.

NGĀ KŌRERORERO | DISCUSSION

Ideas, projects, and activities make a major contribution to the wellbeing of communities across the Taupō District. Council has a variety of funding opportunities available to assist these initiatives through its community grants programme.

Applicants must meet the eligibility requirements and criteria as outlined in the Grants and Partnerships Policy (“the Policy”). The Policy was adopted in July 2021 and the next review date is scheduled to align with the development of the 2024 – 34 Long-term Plan, or unless otherwise agreed by Council.

One of the funding opportunities available is the Tūrangi Tongariro Community Grant. The purpose of this grant is to support community organisations or groups living in the Tūrangi Tongariro Ward who are making a difference in their community. Projects and activities may vary between one off events to capital projects. The grant has \$65,000.00 available to be allocated in the 2023/24 financial year.

The upcoming round will be accepting applications from 4 - 29 September 2023. Applications will be considered, and funding allocated at a distribution meeting on Wednesday 18 October 2023.

Historically, the Tūrangi Tongariro Community Board were distributors of the Tūrangi Tongariro Community Grant. Moving forward the grant will be allocated by the Tūrangi Tongariro Community Grant Distribution Committee.

The Tūrangi Tongariro Grant Distribution Committee comprises of five members in total. The purpose of this paper is to receive nominations and appoint two Ngāti Tūrangitukua representatives to the committee. Current representatives include:

- Ngāti Tūrangitukua Representative from the Tūrangi Co-Governance Committee (tbc)
- Ngāti Tūrangitukua Representative from the Tūrangi Co-Governance Committee (tbc)
- Mayor David Trewavas
- Councillor Sandra Greenslade
- Councillor Karam Fletcher

WHAKAKAPINGA | CONCLUSION

The Tūrangi Tongariro Community Grant must have an allocation committee established to distribute this fund. \$65,000.00 is available to be distributed for the 2023/24 financial year. The committee must also have representation from both the Tūrangi Co-Governance Committee and the Tongariro Representative Group.

The committee is currently scheduled to meet on Wednesday 18 October to distribute funds. This will provide the opportunity for the committee to connect with community organisations to hear more about needs and aspirations within their communities.

A dashboard report summarising key actions within the Mana Whakahono workplan is attached. Of the 23 actions outlined in the report, 60% are either complete or on track.

40% of the remaining actions are ongoing with some deviations from the agreed timeframe however they're being managed, and, in most cases, interim processes are in place until longer-term procedures are agreed and documented.

5.6 ANNUAL PLAN 2023/24 SUBMISSION FEEDBACK

TE PŪTAKE | PURPOSE

To provide feedback to the Tūrangi Co-Governance Committee on their submission made to the Annual Plan 2023-24.

NGĀ KŌRERORERO | DISCUSSION

The Tūrangi Co-Governance Committee provided feedback on the questions outlined in the Annual Plan Consultation Document and also made several other suggestions for Council consideration. Council officers provided responses to the various aspects raised in the submission which were then considered by Elected Members during hearings and deliberations. The decisions made on key questions and responses to specific matters raised are provided below.

- Question 1 of the consultation document sought feedback on whether Council should invest an initial \$7.646 million into the development of a 6-hectare area within the East Urban Lands for the 2023-24 financial year. Council resolved to approve the funding for stage one of the East Urban Lands development which will fund earthworks and civil infrastructure. Specifically, the Co-Governance Committee sought that tangata whenua are meaningful engaged in the process. Council acknowledge this and will continue to engage with hapū to enable their input and feedback into the process.
- Question 2 of the consultation document related to whether or not Council should delay depreciation funding by 8% as a mechanism to reduce the rates impact on the community. Council decided to delay depreciation funding, understanding this would ease some pressure for many in the community, while ensuring the impact on future rate ratepayers was minimal with the deficit able to be repaid in the next one to two years.
- A number of changes to the fees and charges schedule were also proposed. Fees and charges are set on a user-pays basis to assist with the operation and maintenance of a variety of services provided to the community, such as swimming pools and libraries. Council adopted all the proposed changes to the fees and charges that were consulted on. Adopting these user-pay fees and charges assists with reducing rates increases as the operational costs are not fully passed onto ratepayers. The Co-Governance Committee sought that the Turtle Pools are made free for school aged children, due to the lack of direct access to Lake Taupō. This was not a matter consulted and to make significant adjustments would require changes to the revenue and financing policy. Council is required to consult with the community on changes like that. This review will be taking place as part of the Long-term Plan and will consider these suggestions from the Committee. Elected Members also queried whether external sponsorship for the pools could be obtained to assist with costs, staff will take this into consideration when developing business cases.
- Another area of interest from the Co-Governance Committee was the provision of more public education around what Council provides to the community free of charge. We acknowledge that this is an area of improvement and while not directly related the Community Engagement and Development team are undertaking work on developing a Civic Education programme which will assist communities to interact with Council and provide a better understanding of processes such as the Annual Plan and Long-term Plan.
- Te Taiopenga o Tūwharetoa has been held at the Taupō Events Centre for many years. The Tūrangi Co-Governance Committee was one of the submitters who asked that Council support this event and not charge for the venue. Te Roopu Taiopenga o Tūwharetoa submitted an application to Creative Taupō funding round in April 2023, with a request to support the event hire costs. The request of \$5,500 was approved in full by the Creative Taupō committee. At the meeting it was suggested that the applicants investigate a partnership agreement with Council. Council officers are currently investigating two relevant work streams, the first looking at the purpose and future of partnership agreements, the second looking at groups applying for community grants to offset the

cost of using Council facilities. The Community Engagement and Development team are working with the Events and Venues team to develop supporting information/guidance on the costs to hire venues for community groups.

- Green waste was another area where the Co-Governance Committee indicated that the community is seeking ways to reduce these costs. The Council currently provides free drop off of leaves during the autumn period in Tūrangi at the Tūrangi Transfer Station. The disposal of green waste still incurs operational costs which need to be recouped. The Long-term Plan process is underway, and similar to the fees and charges for the Turtle Pools, staff are able to explore these through this process.
- The Co-Governance Committee encouraged Council to continue to use Te Reo and follow tikanga. Council will continue to use Te Reo Māori within TDC process and activities. This is supported through provision of Te Reo Māori tuition for staff and elected members, support staff to develop pepeha, have weekly waiata classes, have completed bilingual signage across our Parks facilities, and have facilitated Te Tiriti O Waitangi workshops for staff. In addition, the executive team is developing a Te Reo action plan.

As a result of the decisions made, and final budget adjustments, the rate increase will be an average of 9.1% for the 2023-24 financial year.

The 2023-24 Annual Plan was formally adopted on 30 June 2023 and a copy of the plan is available on Council's website.

Council thank the Tūrangi Co-Governance Committee for their time to submit on the Annual Plan and are happy to have further conversations about matters outlined in the submission, particularly on those matters which are able to be explored through the Long-term Plan process.

5.7 TAUPŌ DISTRICT COUNCIL LONG-TERM PLAN 2024-34

TE PŪTAKE | PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to brief the Tūrangi Co-Governance Committee on the key elements of and timescales for development of Taupō District Council's Long-term Plan (LTP) 2024-34, and emerging priorities.

NGĀ KŌRERORERO | DISCUSSION**What is a Long-term Plan?**

The Long-term Plan is the key document outlining our priorities for the coming ten years and will:

- Describe the vision and outcomes that Council aims to achieve on behalf of the community.
- Outline what Council will deliver to the community in return for the community's investment, and helps provide accountability to the community.
- Outline how work will be funded, including the setting of rates.
- Integrate decision-making.
- Provide a long-term focus.
- Provide an opportunity for our communities to participate in our decision-making processes and help set Council's priorities.

Communities can express their views on the Long-term Plan when it is reviewed every three years.

Why is the Long-term Plan Important?

Our Long-term Plan outlines Council priorities for the district for the next ten years, for all of its services, activities and projects, and strikes a balance between delivering the best possible service, whilst maintaining rates at an affordable level.

By engaging with Council in the development of the Long-term Plan, communities have the opportunity to communicate their needs and aspirations and influence Council priorities.

Initiatives and expenditure must be included in either a Long-term Plan or an Annual Plan for Council to be able to deliver it. If your community wants something delivered over the next three years, the best way for this to be achieved, is for it to be included in the Council Long-term Plan.

Table 1 below summarises the key things members of your community identified as important during the development of Council's previous Long-term Plan, many of which Council can continue to provide support for as a result of your community's support and participation.

Context for the Long-term Plan 2024-34

The Long-term Plan 2024-34 is being developed at a time of significant uncertainty for local government and affordability constraints for our ratepayers. There is also an environment with rapidly changing or uncertain policy in the three waters, resource management, and future for local government reform space.

Furthermore, inflation currently sits at 6.7% (1st quarter of 2023) - higher inflation drives up the costs to Council of providing services to the community. This flows through obvious costs like electricity and fuel, however it also impacts many other elements like insurance, chemicals, professional services and staff costs. In development of the Annual Plan 2023-24, Council agreed to fund 92% of depreciation. This provides some immediate cost relief to ratepayers resulting from inflation volatility. Council will need to find the income to make up the remaining 8% depreciation in coming years.

High inflation and wage stagnation has meant that New Zealander's real earnings relative to inflation have generally decreased over the last two years. Council needs to carefully consider affordability constraints when weighing up its proposed plans.

What will the LTP cover?

In determining Council's priorities for the next ten years, many Council plans, policies and key strategies will be reviewed. Table 2 below summarises some of the key questions that will be asked during this review process.
