5.3 PROJECT UPDATES FOR TŪRANGI AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Tūrangi Revitalisation (Kerb and Channel) Project

The Infrastructure Project Manager – Operations provided an update on the Tūrangi kerb and channel project which had been going on for just over three years. 29 streets had been completed which was around 33 kilometres of kerb and channel out of the 43 kilometres originally identified in the project. Work was being carried out that week in Te Takinga Street that was scheduled to be finished by the end of June. Due to funding from central government already spent, work would not continue on Te Aonini Street. Trees had been cut and stump grinded in the street and a team would tidy the berms. The Project Manager – Operations was liaising with the Council roading team to check if work could be continued in this street later in the year. Thereafter, the remaining streets would be looked at on a street by street basis and brought before the committee with recommendations according to the highest needs and/or greatest risks.

There was no funding available for work to be carried out in Rangiamohia Road but the Project Manager -Operations would work with the council Parks and Reserves team to remove or trim trees following service requests received. The main issues reported for Rangiamohia Road were lifting of footpaths and tree litter.

A list of footpaths requiring replacement had been made and the Project Manager - Operations was working with the council roading team for budget to complete this work and make the footpaths safer.

In answer to questions, the Project Manager Operations advised the following:

- Hirangi Road was not part of the original scope of the project.
- Further trees scheduled for removal would come before the committee for a decision.
- An end of project presentation would be organised to show the work that had been done and include a karakia.
- A contractor would complete four parking bays near the Te Kapua Park papa tākaro during June 2024 following feedback from previous meetings.

Long-term Plan 2024-34 Engagement

The General Manager People and Community Partnerships thanked members for their dedication to be part of the engagement with the community on the Long-term Plan. Over 30 sessions had been planned throughout the Taupō District supported by staff, elected members and committee members. The vibe of the sessions would be about talking to people kanohi ki te kanohi and having a kōrero. Members were encouraged to attend the biggest session in Tūrangi scheduled for the following Wednesday evening at St Johns, also so that they could hear the views of the community.

The General Manager People and Community Partnerships explained that people that attended and expressed a view should be enouraged to make a written submission for it to be heard. Council officers were

trying to break down barriers to submitting so there were many ways to submit.

The Senior Policy Advisor advised that the hearings would commence the week of 29 July 2024 and submitters were usually allocated five minutes to speak to their submissions. Locations of hearings would be confirmed once submissions had been received to ascertain if it would be appropriate to hold any hearings outside of Taupō.

Regarding queries around the Tūrangi recreation facility, members were encouraged to read the Consultation Document which explained that what would be built was affordable for the community to maintain. It was important that it was also located in the correct place and aligned with work for the Tūrangi town centre. The Long-term Plan proposed that a Tūrangi town centre structure planning exercise be completed first and budget had been allocated from year five for the new facility.

The Co-Governance Management Partner provided updates regarding the projects with Amber RAG status in the dashboard report:

24.1 and 26.2 Resource Consents

The Council team and representatives from Ngāti Tūrangitukua were working together to find a suitable date to meet and progress the agreed approach to processing and monitoring Resource Consents.

37.3, 37.4 Operational Management Matters

The Council Parks and Reserves team had suggested that there was an opportunity to look at operational matters in the next Annual Plan 2025-26.

44.2 Urupā Maintenance

Member Amy Walker advised that she was waiting for the representative from the Waipapa 1A Trust committee to share the proposed maintenance plan for the urupā that could then be shared with Council as well.

10.19[d] Tūrangi Recreational Activity Centre

This was subject to changes made through the Long-term Plan process.

Other matters:

The Co-Governance Management Partner updated members on the recent Mana Whakahono Working Group meeting held in May. She advised that Acting General Manager Operations and Delivery Tony Hale had delivered an update regarding the Tūrangi Waste Water disposal. Staff were working on a process for the offer back of the land of the Tūrangi Holiday Park. It was a priority of the group to jointly approach and engage with the Tūrangi Golf Club to explore some plans to identify and protect the significant sites on the land.

Additional wording was yet to be provided to recognise sites of significance in the wording of new leases and licences in Tūrangi such as the Toi Toi Food Co.

A workshop would be scheduled for July or August for the committee to provide feedback on how the Mana Whakahono was tracking and identify any opportunities for changes as part of the initial review process.

5.5 MEMBERS' REPORTS

The following members' reports were received:

Cr Sandra Greenslade

- Attended the Business After 5 at Tūwharetoa FM on 2 May. Tūwharetoa FM had created a podcast environment and a fabulous night was had by all.
- All of the Council community grants were oversubscribed across the district which showed the need of the community.
- Attended the Emergency Management Committee meeting on 13 May and was impressed by all of the work being done in that space. She emphasised that Tūrangi was an at risk area and that residents needed to be prepared.
- Attended a joint meeting with Destination Great Lake Taupō (DGLT) and Amplify at Waiora House. Amplify were offering educational courses and she encouraged community members to take part.
- Lake Taupō Hospice had held a fundraising event at the Returned Services Association on 17 May including a successful quiz evening. Le Pine & Co were assisting with providing wills and Enduring Power of Attorney free of charge, provided a bequest was made to the Lake Taupō Hospice.
- Featured in the newspaper in her capacity as a Taupō District Councillor and talked about the Maru Energy Trust. Low users of power could be eligible to apply for a credit to assist with paying the power bill.
- Attended a pink ribbon breakfast where the expected turnout of 60 people had been doubled on 25 May. She thanked the owner of New World Tūrangi who had supplied food for free.
- Attended the Business After 5 event at Tongariro School. Unfortunately the funding had been removed for the new building at the school which was a challenge.
- Attended the Motutere Recreation Reserve Management Plan Committee workshop in Tūrangi on 30 May where members of the public and holiday park owner Mr Tilton were also in attendance.

Member Amanda Martin left the meeting at this point (11.32am).

Member Amy Walker

- A wānanga would be held the following weekend at Hirangi Marae for Tārai waka which was a restoration project to put the waka back on the water.
- Had engaged with Principal Sharlyn Holt at Tongariro School about the naming of the buildings and classrooms, and hoped that a ceremony would occur in the next couple of weeks. The refurbished building at the school would also be opened.

Cr Kevin Taylor

 Spoke to Taupō District Council's submission to the Local Government (Electoral Legislation and Māori Wards and Māori Constituencies) Amendment Bill Select Committee the previous day with Mayor David Trewavas in Wellington. He reassured the committee that Council was in favour of keeping the Māori ward and that whatever happened, the mahi and commitment of the Tūrangi Co-Governance Committee remained unchanged.

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Member Lauren Fletcher

- Ngāti Tūrangitukua had received a copy of Council's submission to the above bill and supported it in its submission. Representatives from Ngāti Tūrangitukua would speak to the Select Committee in Wellington the following day.
- Ngāti Tūrangitukua Charitable Trust had held a housing wānanga to develop papakāinga on 214 Te Rangitautahanga Road. The wānanga was held with whānau to understand aspirations. Fiona Daniel from Hapū Housing Solutions was helping to finalise the strategic plan and business case.

Member Christian Asher

- Also attended Business After 5 and was happy to see the large turnout.
- Had been advised by the local fire chief that it was a difficult season for roading accidents and that crews were being called frequently to the Desert Road for accidents related to black ice. He requested that the message be put out for drivers to take extra care.
- It was important that an emergency plan for the local area was made and shared with the community so that people knew what was happening and what to do should there be an emergency.
- The National karate tournament was held in Tūrangi on 12 May. Karate competitors Emma Speedy and Grace Hura were travelling to London later in the year for the World Shoto Cup. Mark Willis Shihan had been selected as an international judge which was a high honour. The Tūrangi team attended the karate regional competition the previous weekend.
- A community event for Matariki would be held at the Returned Services Association.
- The Lines Company recently presented to Safe Tūrangi about using power and the alternative power plans that existed.
- Commended the Parks and Reserves team for their hard work around the Tūrangi township.
- Students from Te Kura O Hirangi were preparing to travel to Tahiti and students from Tongariro School were preparing to travel to Thailand.

Member Te Takinga New

- Asked for posts regarding the meaning of Matariki to be shared to social media.
- Asked for local recipients of King's birthday honours to be acknowledged and thanked by the Committee.
- Thanked the Taupō District Council team for the recent submissions to the Fast-track Approvals Bill and the Local Government (Electoral Legislation and Māori Wards and Māori Constituencies) Amendment Bill. He asked that Council informed committee members of any potential disturbances if the Fast-track Approvals Bill passed so that negative outcomes could be avoided such as what had happened in Tūrangi in the 1960s. He noted that the current Council was aware of who Ngāti Tūrangitukua was and he hoped that there were processes in place internally so that new councillors were aware of relationships with hapū and how they worked.
- This was the best time of year for fishing. The General Manager People and Community Partnerships confirmed that the Department of Conservation and Destination Great Lake Taupō were the entities that would promote this.
- Asked for the committee to be able to change the street name of Frethey Drive.
- Asked for a ceremony to involve the young people and formally open the new street in Tūrangi off Rangiamohia Road, Te Wairēmana Place.

Mayor David Trewavas

- Attended the Recreation Aotearoa awards the previous week in Christchurch and was proud to accept the merit award on behalf of Ngāti Tūrangitukua and Council for the Te Kapua park papa tākaro.

CHAIRPERSON

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Extracts from Standing Orders 2022-2025

15. Public Forums | Ngā Matapakinga a te Marea

Public forums are a defined period of time, usually at the start of an ordinary meeting, which, at the discretion of a meeting, is put aside for the purpose of public input. Public forums are designed to enable members of the public to bring matters of their choice, not necessarily on the meeting's agenda, to the attention of the local authority.

In the case of a committee, subcommittee, local or community board, any issue, idea, or matter raised in a public forum, must fall within the terms of reference of that body.

15.1 Time limits | Ngā tepenga wā

A period of up to 30 minutes, or such longer time as the meeting may determine, will be available for the public forum at each scheduled local authority meeting. Requests must be made to the chief executive (or their delegate) at least one clear day before the meeting; however this requirement may be waived by the chairperson. Requests should also outline the matters that will be addressed by the speaker(s).

Speakers can speak for up to 5 minutes. Where the number of speakers presenting in the public forum exceeds 6 in total, the chairperson has discretion to restrict the speaking time permitted for all presenters.

15.2 Restrictions | Ngā Herenga

The chairperson has the discretion to decline to hear a speaker or to terminate a presentation at any time where:

- A speaker is repeating views presented by an earlier speaker at the same public forum;
- The speaker is criticising elected members and/or staff;
- The speaker is being repetitious, disrespectful or offensive;
- The speaker has previously spoken on the same issue;
- The matter is subject to legal proceedings; and
- The matter is subject to a hearing, including the hearing of submissions where the local authority or committee sits in a quasi-judicial capacity.

15.3 Questions at public forums | Ngā pātai i ngā matapakinga a te marea

At the conclusion of the presentation, with the permission of the chairperson, elected members may ask questions of speakers. Questions are to be confined to obtaining information or clarification on matters raised by a speaker.

15.4 No resolutions | Kāore he tatūnga

Following the public forum, no debate or decisions will be made at the meeting on issues raised during the forum unless related to items already on the agenda. (See the LGNZ Guide to Standing Orders for suggestions of good practice in dealing with issues raised during a forum).

15.5 Application of restrictions I Te hangaitanga o nga Herenga

Clause 15.2 above applies to members of the public addressing meetings at any time, not just as part of a scheduled public forum session.

Extracts from Standing Orders 2022-2025

9.1 Items of business not on the agenda which cannot be delayed | Ngā take kāore i runga i te rārangi take e kore e taea te whakaroa

A meeting may deal with an item of business that is not on the agenda where the meeting resolves to deal with that item and the chairperson provides the following information during the public part of the meeting:

- (a) The reason the item is not on the agenda; and
- (b) The reason why the discussion of the item cannot be delayed until a subsequent meeting.

LGOIMA, s 46A(7).

Items not on the agenda may be brought before the meeting through a report from either the chief executive or the chairperson.

Please note, that nothing in this standing order removes the requirement to meet the provisions of Part 6 of the LGA 2002 with regard to consultation and decision-making.

9.2 Discussion of minor matters not on the agenda | Te kōrerorero i ngā take iti kāore i runga i te rārangi take

A meeting may discuss an item that is not on the agenda only if it is a minor matter relating to the general business of the meeting and the chairperson explains at the beginning of the public part of the meeting that the item will be discussed. However, the meeting may not make a resolution, decision, or recommendation about the item, except to refer it to a subsequent meeting for further discussion.


