4.1 TAUPŌ AIRPORT AUTHORITY COMMITTEE MEETING - 14 OCTOBER 2024

5 NGĀ RIPOATA | REPORTS

5.1 **OPERATIONS UPDATE**

The Airport Operations Manager provided an update to the Committee about airport operations. The following points were noted:

- The Council water main replacement project was nearing completion.
- The first cropping of the financial year had been completed. The crop was not bailed for later collection but immediately transported off site. The contractor had advised it was a good harvest. Another cut was scheduled for early in the New Year.
- Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) signage had been updated in accordance with CAA instructions. Existing signage had been reused to keep costs down.
- The UAV (drone) application trial would 'go live' on 5 December 2024. This would involve a switch from the Taupō Airport website to the drone platform. Six airports were taking part in the three-month trial. There was no cost for the trial.
- The Taupō Airport Safety User Group had met on 20 November 2024. Minutes would be circulated to members once available.
- The Sky Cats Boogie parachute event was scheduled to take place at Taupō Airport 6-8 December 2024. The grass runway would be closed for the event. There would be no interference with scheduled flights, separation rules would apply. General aviation aeronautical charges would be paid.
- Regular airport users were parking aircraft in the area adjacent to the grass runway. This was a temporary solution while the apron extension project was underway.
- HVAC remedial works were complete and the GHD audit report would be issued before the end of the year.
- The annual Taupō Airport User Group meeting was scheduled to take place at 6pm on 9 December 2024.
- The Tūrangi aerodrome lease was due to expire in February 2025.
- Airport staff were working with Council events staff to ensure visitors had an enjoyable experience while travelling to and from the VinFast IRONMAN 70.3 World Championship taking place in Taupō on 14 and 15 December 2024. Air New Zealand had scheduled additional flights in and out of Taupō over a 10 day period to accommodate additional demand generated by IRONMAN competitors and supporters. The apron extension project contractor would pause works at times to avoid any conflicts with scheduled flights.
- Passenger numbers had been increasing prior to the Sounds Air withdrawal from Taupō. General aircraft movements were down 11% but revenue was holding steady compared to last year.

5.2 FINANCE REPORT FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2024

The Finance Business Partner summarised the information set out on the agenda in relation to Taupō Airport finances. She added that the Council rates invoice had been received and was higher than budget, so there would be a \$16k discrepancy on the rates line at year end.

In answer to questions, the Finance Business Partner advised that:

- The airport still needed to repay \$100k of the loan from Taupō District Council. The General Manager Airport added that the loan was due to be repaid in 2027.
- Payments had not yet been processed to Fulton Hogan for the apron extension project.

5.3 CAPITAL PROJECTS UPDATE

The General Manager Airport provided an update about capital projects at Taupō Airport, with points noted as follows:

- The baggage make-up extension to the northern end of the terminal was completed in October.
- The rolling programme for boundary fencing was in the Statement of Intent for the next three years. Fencing to the south would be replaced first. This was an extensive length of 1.2m high fencing and costs would be shared 50:50 with the Ministry of Transport.
- The gate to airside was also due to be replaced and the new gate would be automated.
- The apron extension project was on track to finish by Christmas 2024.

This was expected to cost \$50-60k. The current structure was still not well understood, so Ford Sumner would clarify that so progress considering options could be made.

5.5 REGIONAL INFRASTRUCTURE FUND

The General Manager Airport was working with the Kānoa – Regional Economic Development and Investment Unit (RDU) at the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment to explore possible funding applications for the Taupō Airport. The RDU would consider projects with a value of \$5m to \$10m and loans would be able to be paid back over a long period of time. Discussions would continue and the Taupō Airport Authority would be kept updated.

5.6 CAR PARKING CHARGES REVIEW 2025

Members considered options for car parking charges at Taupō Airport.

In answer to questions, the General Manager Airport advised that:

- Visitors did use the car park and parking in surrounding areas outside the car park was not an issue.
- It was necessary to charge for parking to pay for the operations, any damages and asset depreciation.
- The airport had trialled free lunchtime parking in the past, but not many people had taken advantage of the offer.
- The charges would still be below the average of other regional airports if the Committee approved the recommended increases.

Members decided to approve increases of \$1 on hourly rates up to 6 hours, with a day charge of \$16 for up to three days and then \$14 per day afterwards.
