5 NGĀ RIPOATA | REPORTS

5.1 OPERATIONS UPDATE

The Airport Operations Manager and the Safety Manager provided an update to the Committee about airport operations. The following points were noted:

- The Council water main replacement project was nearing completion. There had been a couple of planned water outages whilst the contractor was provisioning for water mains under ANZAC Memorial Drive.
- Originair's inaugural flight between Wellington and Taupō on 17 February 2025 was a success. Marketing was ongoing, as it was important to continue to raise awareness of the availability of flights between Taupō and Wellington three times per week. Pricing was competitive at lead-in fares of \$99 one way. If the service was well-used, there was the potential to increase the frequency to six flights per week. Originair also offers connections to Westport and Nelson.
- The UAV (drone) AirShare free trial had been extended for a further six months. The application was easy to operate and visibility was good. On the whole, the feedback from operators had been positive.
- An Airport Safety Group meeting was held on 12 February 2025. Items of interest included open items awaiting Civil Aviation Authority response; discussion about the safety component of the apron extension project; and ongoing wildlife control.
- The Taupō Airport Safety Manager had met with Originair's Safety Manager to discuss the diversity of the airspace and the various airport users. That information would be passed on to Originair flight crews.
- A ladies skydiving event at Taupō airport was planned for 6 March 2025.
- There had been one occurance of an unauthorised UAV over Taupō. Public education about the use of these devices would continue.
- The Aeronautical Information Publication (AIP) would be updated with new markings and information relating to the remarking of the apron area following the surface treatment project.
- Most of the timber from the three gum trees removed landside had been taken away. There were a few stumps remaining and then a final tidy-up of the area would be done.
- The Taupō Airport Authority presented to the annual Airport Users Group meeting on 9 December 2024, with several topics being covered. The Chairperson asked for an invitation to future annual user group meetings to be sent to Taupō Airport Authority Committee members.
- The final inspection of the Tūrangi aerodrome by Taupō Airport Authority had been carried out ahead of the sub-licence with the aeroclub expiring on 27 February 2025 and the Council's lease with the land owner expiring on 28 February 2025.

The General Manager Airport concluded the update with a summary of recent passenger and aircraft movements.

5.4 TAUPŌ AIRPORT AUTHORITY DRAFT STATEMENT OF INTENT 2025 - 2028

The General Manager Airport explained that the draft Statement of Intent would be sent to Council and the Ministry of Transport for review. The Committee Chairperson observed that the Statement of Intent including proposed capital projects aligned to the airport master plan.

In response to a question, the General Manager Airport advised that an asset management plan for the airport needed to be developed. He added that there was a mix between Taupō Airport Authority and Taupō District Council owned assets.

In response to another question, the General Manager Airport explained that the Ministry of Transport would only contribute funding for essential airside projects that were required to comply with the aerodrome operating certificate.

Members agreed to approve the draft Statement of Intent, with one amendment, being the replacement in Section 5.5 Governance Structure Review from ".....repositioning TAA from a Standing Committee of Council to a full Council Controlled Organisation structure" with "....repositioning TAA from a Standing Committee of Council to a Council Controlled Trading Organisation (CCTO)".

5.5 TAUPŌ AIRPORT AUTHORITY CAPITAL PROJECTS UPDATE

The General Manager Airport summarised the report on capital projects, including the apron extension; apron surface treatment; and boundary fencing. He answered questions, with input from the Airport Operations Manager. Additional points were noted as follows.

Apron extension

- The project was a success, with the main challenge being transport of asphalt from Hamilton, but that was resolved and the end product was very good.
- Grass reseed around the perimeter of the new works was being planned for later in the year when growing conditions would be more favourable. Aircraft could relocate to the new General Aviation (GA) grass parking area in the meantime.

Apron surface treatment

- Management would meet with the contractor the following week and discussions would include plans for phasing the work to enable apron operations to continue throughout.
- The work would probably be done in three or four phases and the material would require warm temperatures to cure, so would be done during daylight hours.
- Once complete, the apron area would be remarked.

Boundary fencing

The project was underway and a lot of rock had been encountered.

Cropping

Council had agreed a new contract with the current airport contractor to crop 40ha of Council land on the south side of the airport southern boundary fence. It was hoped that the contractor will crop again as part of the airport contract before the end of the season.

5.8 PROPOSED LAND SUBDIVISION AT TAUPŌ AIRPORT

The General Manager Airport provided an update on the proposal to subdivide land at Taupō airport, and answered questions. The following points were noted:

- The documents were ready to sign, but it was unclear whether any conditions would be in place.
- Once signed, Taupō Airport Authority could take over Lots 50, 51 and 52, which would open up access to the area beyond and enable development to occur in accordance with the airport master plan.
- The helicopter extension area could be developed once the District Plan change process was complete. Noise levels would be monitored and solutions identified if required.

5.9 TAUPO AIRPORT AUTHORITY CORPORATISATION

The General Manager Airport reported that Ford Sumner's legal advice had been received. He provided a summary of the advice and answered questions.

24 February 2025

The following points were noted:

- The advice confirmed that Taupō airport was a Council Controlled Organisation but would be required to be a Council Controlled Trading Organisation if a separate entity was established.
- Existing Taupō Airport Authority Committee members could not automatically be transferred to a new governance structure (board of directors). The new structure would not include elected members. It would be very important to appoint the right people with the appropriate mix of skills required to govern the airport. It would also be important to ensure controls were in place to manage conflicts of interest.
- If the process was started in one month's time, it could be completed by the local government elections in October 2025.
- The process would include a two-month consultation period.
- Council would need to consider whether to commence the process, and timeframes.
- Whether or not the joint venture would continue would be clarified via the process.
- The Ministry of Transport had indicated its support for a change in governance structure, but also that the Ministry would want input into the appointment process.
- Accounting advice would also need to be obtained, particularly in relation to the treatment of Taupō Airport Authority's tax credits.

The General Manager Strategy and Environment and the General Manager Airport would continue to discuss the matter and provide further updates to the Committee in due course.

5.10 TŪRANGI AERODROME

The General Manager Airport summarised the report. The following points were noted during questions, answers and related discussion:

- A private operator had come forward to become the new named operator of the non-certified Tūrangi aerodrome from 1 March 2025. Those details had been passed on to the Civil Aviation Authority. The last inspection report had been provided to the proposed named operator.
- Taupō Airport Authority had no involvement with leasing arrangements at the Tūrangi aerodrome. The land would be transferred back to family members in June 2025. Until then, Council and the Taupō Airport Authority would assist by mowing the airstrip; helping to change the named operator; and providing information.

CHAIRPERSON

Extracts from Standing Orders 2022-2025

15. Public Forums | Ngā Matapakinga a te Marea

Public forums are a defined period of time, usually at the start of an ordinary meeting, which, at the discretion of a meeting, is put aside for the purpose of public input. Public forums are designed to enable members of the public to bring matters of their choice, not necessarily on the meeting's agenda, to the attention of the local authority.

In the case of a committee, subcommittee, local or community board, any issue, idea, or matter raised in a public forum, must fall within the terms of reference of that body.

15.1 Time limits | Ngā tepenga wā

A period of up to 30 minutes, or such longer time as the meeting may determine, will be available for the public forum at each scheduled local authority meeting. Requests must be made to the chief executive (or their delegate) at least one clear day before the meeting; however this requirement may be waived by the chairperson. Requests should also outline the matters that will be addressed by the speaker(s).

Speakers can speak for up to 5 minutes. Where the number of speakers presenting in the public forum exceeds 6 in total, the chairperson has discretion to restrict the speaking time permitted for all presenters.

15.2 Restrictions | Ngā Herenga

The chairperson has the discretion to decline to hear a speaker or to terminate a presentation at any time where:

- A speaker is repeating views presented by an earlier speaker at the same public forum;
- The speaker is criticising elected members and/or staff;
- The speaker is being repetitious, disrespectful or offensive;
- The speaker has previously spoken on the same issue;
- The matter is subject to legal proceedings; and
- The matter is subject to a hearing, including the hearing of submissions where the local authority or committee sits in a quasi-judicial capacity.

15.3 Questions at public forums | Ngā pātai i ngā matapakinga a te marea

At the conclusion of the presentation, with the permission of the chairperson, elected members may ask questions of speakers. Questions are to be confined to obtaining information or clarification on matters raised by a speaker.

15.4 No resolutions | Kāore he tatūnga

Following the public forum, no debate or decisions will be made at the meeting on issues raised during the forum unless related to items already on the agenda. (See the LGNZ Guide to Standing Orders for suggestions of good practice in dealing with issues raised during a forum).

15.5 Application of restrictions I Te hangaitanga o nga Herenga

Clause 15.2 above applies to members of the public addressing meetings at any time, not just as part of a scheduled public forum session.

Extracts from Standing Orders 2022-2025

9.1 Items of business not on the agenda which cannot be delayed | Ngā take kāore i runga i te rārangi take e kore e taea te whakaroa

A meeting may deal with an item of business that is not on the agenda where the meeting resolves to deal with that item and the chairperson provides the following information during the public part of the meeting:

- (a) The reason the item is not on the agenda; and
- (b) The reason why the discussion of the item cannot be delayed until a subsequent meeting.

LGOIMA, s 46A(7).

Items not on the agenda may be brought before the meeting through a report from either the chief executive or the chairperson.

Please note, that nothing in this standing order removes the requirement to meet the provisions of Part 6 of the LGA 2002 with regard to consultation and decision-making.

9.2 Discussion of minor matters not on the agenda | Te kōrerorero i ngā take iti kāore i runga i te rārangi take

A meeting may discuss an item that is not on the agenda only if it is a minor matter relating to the general business of the meeting and the chairperson explains at the beginning of the public part of the meeting that the item will be discussed. However, the meeting may not make a resolution, decision, or recommendation about the item, except to refer it to a subsequent meeting for further discussion.

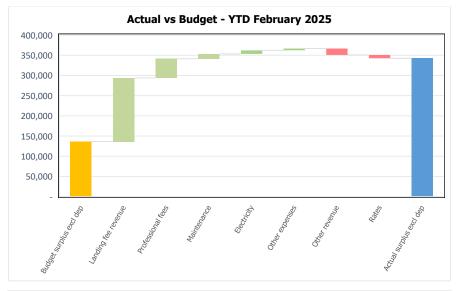

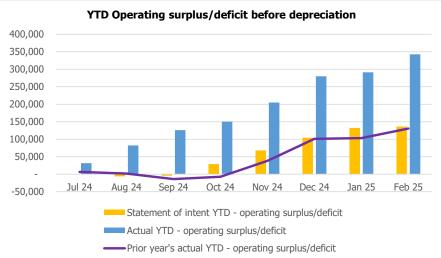
FINANCE REPORT

FINANCE REPORT – YTD February 2025

Statement of Financial Performance

- Operating revenue overall is \$141k favourable to budget due to the commercial landing charges. Although passenger numbers have remained below budget, the contractually committed forecast numbers has yielded the positive variance.
- Operating costs are \$64k favourable to budget mostly due to professional fees. Rates expense is \$8k unfavourable to budget and expected to be \$15k unfavourable to budget by the end of the financial year mostly due to the increase in capital value of the terminal building in the last financial year.
- Overall operating surplus after depreciation is \$12k which is \$191k favourable to budget.
