5.3 LEASE TO DEPARTMENT OF CONSERVATION (FORMER TŪRANGI SERVICE CENTRE)

The Special Projects Lead – Property presented the item and summarised the report on behalf of the Reserve Management and Property Officer.

In answer to questions, he clarified the following:

- No immediate plans for the former Service Centre had been made. By extending the lease, it would allow Council time and opportunity to think about this.
- The Tūrangi Rangatahi Hub used two of the offices in the building and would still be allowed to do this if the lease was extended for the Department of Conservation.

5.4 TŪRANGI WHAREPAKU

The Special Projects Lead – Property summarised the report and asked if members could consider the two parts to the report separately, being the approval of the design, and allocating the number of unisex or designated gender toilets.

It was explained that a design was added showing the natural flow of wai from Ranginui through to Papataunuku, through the springs, into the awa and then into the lake. Further details fed into the papa takaro design. The goal was to make the best impression possible on visitors and it was important that the design and facility reflects that.

It was explained that if there was remaining budget then some of the additional features could be added retrospectively.

The committee supported the recommended option for the design.

Unisex toilets align with national/global trends and would be more flexible in peak usage however there were hygiene and cleanliness concerns. Officers were seeking direction from the Committee.

It was explained that the interior for the toilets was the same and the sign on the outside could be changed in the future if there was a desire to change any of the toilets from unisex to gender specific.

The Committee asked that two of the toilets be allocated for wahine and the rest would be unisex, they suggested having this as a trial and asked officers to bring it back to the Committee if it was not working.

5.5 OPERATIONS AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT UPDATES FOR TŪRANGI

The Southern Lake Taupō Engagement Partner updated members on the following:

Long-term Plan early engagement

The Community Development team had been having planning sessions for Long-term Plan (LTP) early engagement and some placeholders with individual communities have been booked from 13 May. Youth week was also on at the same time at LTP engagements so she would go to local schools with other social services and share some civic education games and teach kids.

Wider community team were conscious of the fuel crisis and were working on plans to continue to engage kanohi ki te kanohi (face to face).

Representative Group Review

Feedback received was people were happy they were listened to and the Tongariro Representative Group was established.

Civic Education

Workshops were being rolled out to schools for terms two and three. The focus was on helping students and teachers understand what the Council does and how and why it matters, and to encourage participation and curiosity. She advised she will work with the Iwi and Co-Governance team to deliver this in the kura in te reo Māori.

Tūrangi Markets

Ms Carol Harwood took over the licence to occupy and will continue to run the markets. The Engagement Team will continue to head to the markets on a regular basis with topics of interest to share and discuss with communities to keep them up to date. The team wanted to inform the community and welcomed an open kōrero.

Matariki Proposal

A celebration for Matariki was being planned with some keen volunteers and more information would be provided at the next hui.

Events

Easter was coming up and there would be the easter bunny and eggs around the town. There would be the annual easter car-boot sale with all 35 sites sold. Town market would also be busy with all stall holders being present.

Wednesday Waiata

There were waiata classes on Wednesday from 8.30am until 9.30am, guitarists were there and she encouraged more to come along.

The Co-Governance Management Partner highlighted the following from the Dashboard Report attached to the agenda:

Clause 9.1 and 9.3 Inductions for staff and elected members

The induction was scheduled for the following day and she thanked Ngāti Tūrangitukua for all of the work that had gone into the induction.

Clause 10.19[d] Tūrangi recreational activity centre

The Policy Manager provided an update at the workshop held prior to the meeting.

Clause 10.35 Cultural Values Assessment

The completion date had been pushed to end of April to allow time to go to the Taiao Committee for Ngāti Tūrangitukua

Clause 13.4 Review of the Mana Whakahono

This will be reported back to the Committee in either May or June.

Clause 31.3 Early engagement on three water infrastructure projects

This consent process was slow but it was progressing, following this there would be a better process for collaboration.

Clause 36.3 Tūrangi Reserve Management Plan

These actions would be started now the Tūrangi Reserve Management Plan was complete and the committee would be updated.

Schedule 2 Hearings commissioners

There will be no notified plan changes due to the government's Plan Stop legislation so the completion of the hearing commissioner process will be put on hold. However if a hearing needed to be held, officers would work with Ngāti Tūrangitukua to get representation on the hearings panel.

Partnership approach to policy, planning and regulatory development

Under the Mana Whakahono, there was an agreement to work together on the development of the Long-term Plan. An initial discussion was held at the Joint Working Group meeting last week. A hui with all iwi partners was scheduled on 22 April in Taupō. Officers would continue to work with Ngāti Tūrangitukua to make sure there was process in place for Ngāti Tūrangitukua to be involved in the development of the Long-term Plan and the Water Services Strategy.

She explained she has been working with the Parks and Reserves team and wanted to hold a workshop with the Committee on reserves, including land ownership, types of reserves and how they were to be administered under the settlement.

Co-Governance Committee Partnership Plan Implementation.

The committee and project team agreed that a workshop needs to be scheduled to discuss the current plan with the committee and to confirm the actions and implementation from here.

5.7 MEMBERS' REPORTS

The following members' reports were received:

Cr Ngāhuia Foreman

- The Tongariro Representative Group Committee was established the previous day and the Expressions of Interest process begun today for community representatives. Cr Sandra Greenslade was appointed the Chair and she was also on the committee.
- She advised that she has received a lot of comments regarding roaming dogs.

Member Bernice Te Ahuru

- Heavy trucks continue to park on Waipapa reserve.

Poumatua Te Wharau Walker Jnr

- He had a conversation with the Mayor regarding the fuel crisis and if it continued, options to reduce fuel usage would be considered and asked members to be flexible going forward and online options might be looked at.

Mayor John Funnell

- He explained that the fuel crisis was serious and should not be under-estimated. He believed there would be restrictions after Easter.

Member Lauren Fletcher

- A Tūrangi gambler sporting event was held the previous weekend and it was successful.
- Dambusters had annual league carnival and it was really good with the fields marked out and the grounds were well kept. Great feedback was received on the Te Mataapuna building.
- The swimming club went to Taumarunui to a carnival which was a great learning for them. They wished to host in Tūrangi however this could be an issue due to no diving blocks.
- Te Arawa regional kapa haka event at Rotorua stadium was a great event for reviving kapa haka.
- Ngāti Tūrangitukua worked with the Department of Conservation to clear some heather from Pihanga. Heather and die back would be looked at by Ngāti Tūrangitukua at an upcoming taiao hui.

Member Amy Walker

- Dogs were roaming on public reserves with up to six dogs at a time hunting. It was being reported but the dogs would be gone.
- Events were held in Tūrangi last weekend with lots of cars on Hirangi Road. She advised the management of the speed on the road needed to be explored again. When large events are scheduled, cars need to be slowed down due to the volume.
- Wastewater discharge from under Tongariro Bridge, the issue was a pipe damaged. This highlighted that it was an old pipe requiring maintenance. Spillage went onto the reserve and did not get into the river. She commended the response from the Council team for being quick however it highlighted that manholes likely need to be located elsewhere and some of the pipes were really old.

CHAIRPERSON

Extracts from Standing Orders 2022-2025

15. Public Forums | Ngā Matapakinga a te Marea

Public forums are a defined period of time, usually at the start of an ordinary meeting, which, at the discretion of a meeting, is put aside for the purpose of public input. Public forums are designed to enable members of the public to bring matters of their choice, not necessarily on the meeting's agenda, to the attention of the local authority.

In the case of a committee, subcommittee, local or community board, any issue, idea, or matter raised in a public forum, must fall within the terms of reference of that body.

15.1 Time limits | Ngā tepenga wā

A period of up to 30 minutes, or such longer time as the meeting may determine, will be available for the public forum at each scheduled local authority meeting. Requests must be made to the chief executive (or their delegate) at least one clear day before the meeting; however this requirement may be waived by the chairperson. Requests should also outline the matters that will be addressed by the speaker(s).

Speakers can speak for up to 5 minutes. Where the number of speakers presenting in the public forum exceeds 6 in total, the chairperson has discretion to restrict the speaking time permitted for all presenters.

15.2 Restrictions | Ngā Herenga

The chairperson has the discretion to decline to hear a speaker or to terminate a presentation at any time where:

- A speaker is repeating views presented by an earlier speaker at the same public forum;
- The speaker is criticising elected members and/or staff;
- The speaker is being repetitious, disrespectful or offensive;
- The speaker has previously spoken on the same issue;
- The matter is subject to legal proceedings; and
- The matter is subject to a hearing, including the hearing of submissions where the local authority or committee sits in a quasi-judicial capacity.

15.3 Questions at public forums | Ngā pātai i ngā matapakinga a te marea

At the conclusion of the presentation, with the permission of the chairperson, elected members may ask questions of speakers. Questions are to be confined to obtaining information or clarification on matters raised by a speaker.

15.4 No resolutions | Kāore he tatūnga

Following the public forum, no debate or decisions will be made at the meeting on issues raised during the forum unless related to items already on the agenda. (See the LGNZ Guide to Standing Orders for suggestions of good practice in dealing with issues raised during a forum).

15.5 Application of restrictions | Te hāngaitanga o ngā Herenga

Clause 15.2 above applies to members of the public addressing meetings at any time, not just as part of a scheduled public forum session.

Extracts from Standing Orders 2022-2025**9.1 Items of business not on the agenda which cannot be delayed | Ngā take kāore i runga i te rārangi take e kore e taea te whakaroa**

A meeting may deal with an item of business that is not on the agenda where the meeting resolves to deal with that item and the chairperson provides the following information during the public part of the meeting:

- (a) The reason the item is not on the agenda; and
- (b) The reason why the discussion of the item cannot be delayed until a subsequent meeting.

LGOIMA, s 46A(7).



Items not on the agenda may be brought before the meeting through a report from either the chief executive or the chairperson.

Please note, that nothing in this standing order removes the requirement to meet the provisions of Part 6 of the LGA 2002 with regard to consultation and decision-making.

9.2 Discussion of minor matters not on the agenda | Te kōrerorero i ngā take iti kāore i runga i te rārangi take

A meeting may discuss an item that is not on the agenda only if it is a minor matter relating to the general business of the meeting and the chairperson explains at the beginning of the public part of the meeting that the item will be discussed. However, the meeting may not make a resolution, decision, or recommendation about the item, except to refer it to a subsequent meeting for further discussion.
